(A review of how many children would be served by Crisis Team Contact had low numbers. This position may provide co-response with another crisis staff and/or peer services following up on a crisis event.</p> <p>SBH-ASO did a CPC training in October for 14 people, another training is scheduled for 4/25/2022. Jefferson candidates have completed the training and are prioritized if they will be filling in this program.</p>

Development of Harm Reduction CAP

Scope of Services

Development and execution of a Communications Action Plan (CAP) to support Harm Reduction in Jefferson County as part of the Behavioral Health Consortium's (BHC) effort to end overdose deaths in Jefferson County.

Contractor contribution will include:

- Research and analysis of harm reduction issues to be targeted
- Assistance in writing proposals and plans for digital communications
- Assessment and support for relationship building, including insight generation, education and advocacy with existing and potential partners and allies locally, in-state & nationally.

- Prepare initial assessment of Jefferson County harm reduction landscape and articulate a top priority
- Develop specific action plan to address the resulting top priority
- Initiate execution of prioritized actions outlined in Plan

- Summary of initiated and/or executed actions

Reminders: BHC Data Timeline Update

Updated Reminder: The BHC's next data milestone, covering Sept. 2021 - Feb. 2022, due date has moved from 3/15/22 to **5/15/2022**.

- The delay is due to HRSA's revised measures being in the approval process and then the PIMS system being updated as a result of the revised measures.
- Although the anticipated due date is May 31, the reporting period is the same. Therefore, grantees should ensure they are compiling data for the Sept. 1, 2021 - Feb. 28, 2022, reporting period from their consortium.
- HRSA will update when the PIMS measures open date and due date have been finalized.
- The RCORP Evaluation team is working on [updates to the RCORP Grantee Data Collection Resource Guide and the Excel Consortium Data Collection Workbook](#): Updates are expected in late February. Will let folks know when they've been posted on the website.
- The HRSA biannual progress report is due on March 30, 2022. Lori will reach out to Members for input on the various deliverables: an updated workplan, HRSA's Request for Information (RFI), and data supplemental spreadsheet.

In response to the State v. Blake decision earlier in 2021, the Washington State Legislature passed SB 5476 to address justice system responses to substance use and expand behavioral health prevention, treatment, and related services. This multi-part series will begin with an overview of SB 5476 and then provide ongoing updates to its various components.

Session 1: Overview of SB 5476. Presenters Rep. Lauren Davis and Tony Walton, Health Care Authority, discuss the main components and intentions behind the bill. (November 2021).

Session 2: Law Enforcement Training Development. Presenters Melodie McKee, MS, SUDP and Mandy Owens, PhD talk about another component of SB 5476 which specifically outlines a requirement for law enforcement training. (December 2021)

Session 3: Recovery Navigator Program. Presenters Jennifer Weinman and Suzanne Straub, Health Care Authority, provide an introduction to the Recovery Navigator Program and an overview of behavioral health administrative service organizations (BHASOs), uniform program standards, BHASO program requirements, updates, and the timeline.

Session 4: Legal Changes in 5476. Presenter: Mark Cooke, JD, MSW, ACLU of Washington
In response to the State v. Blake decision earlier in 2021, the Washington State Legislature passed SB 5476 to address “justice system responses and behavioral health prevention, treatment, and related services.”
This presentation will discuss the legal changes outlined in SB 5476, including changes to simple drug possession and paraphernalia laws. A brief description of relevant past laws and legal decisions will be provided, as well as implications for future interpretations of this law.


WA State Bills related to LE's physical use of force, Harm Reduction and Behavioral Health

- [HB 1737](#) - Use for Court Orders or Joel's Law, improving public safety.
- [SB 5919](#) - Concerning the standard for law enforcement authority to detain or pursue persons (Similar to HB 1737) Concerning the standard for law enforcement authority to detain or pursue persons. Will be discussed/reviewed tomorrow (2/3/2022). Discussion that WASPC is supporting and pushing forward HB 5919.
- [SHB 1735](#) - Modifying the standard for use of force by peace officers. Custody under 71.05 and 71.34 ITA Laws and makes a declaration of necessity for officers to respond. Passed on January 28th and read into the senate.
- [HB 2037](#) - Modifying the standard for use of force by peace officers.
- [SB 5509](#) – Exempting fentanyl testing equipment from the definition of drug paraphernalia..
- [SB 5954](#) – Reducing the impacts and incidences of chronic and unsheltered homelessness.had a hearing on 2/3 – result?
- [HB 1761](#) – Allowing nurses to dispense opioid overdose reversal medication in the ED.
- [SB 5524](#) – Is dead. Was focused on imposing a sentence of life in prison for controlled substances homicide for fentanyl-laced drugs.
